



August 7–11, 2026 Poll of U.S. Registered Voters

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Methodology

This national survey of 1,591 U.S. registered voters was conducted by Wave Polling and Research. Fieldwork was carried out online August 7–11, 2026 by Verasight. All respondents were affirmatively matched to the L2 voter file database as registered voters.

Weighting. The data are weighted by Wave Polling and Research using iterative proportional fitting (raking) to registered-voter targets on eleven dimensions: age, race/ethnicity, sex, metropolitan status, household income, education, Census region, and white/non-white race by college or non-college educational attainment, benchmarked to the Current Population Survey; leaned three-way party identification (Democrats including independents who lean Democratic, pure independents, and Republicans including independents who lean Republican), benchmarked to the Pew Research Center’s 2026 National Public Opinion Reference Survey (NPORS); 2024 presidential vote, benchmarked to the certified national results scaled to the registered-voter frame’s turnout, with the non-voter share held at its benchmark value; and local quintile of Trump vote share, in which each respondent’s zip code is matched to precinct-aggregated presidential results calibrated to certified county, congressional-district, and state totals, and binned by the surrounding area’s Trump share of the two-party vote averaged over 2020 and 2024, with each quintile holding one-fifth of the national two-party vote. Weights were raked from uniform starting values and iteratively trimmed to the range [0.2, 5] with margins re-imposed after each trim.

Margin of error. The margin of sampling error accounts for the survey’s design effect, a measure of the loss of statistical power due to survey design and weighting. The Kish design effect of the weights is 1.43, for an effective sample size of 1,109 and a margin of sampling error of plus or minus 2.94 percentage points on a 50% proportion. Real-world error includes sources of error beyond sampling error — such as nonresponse bias, coverage error, and measurement error in self-reports — and margins of sampling error understate total survey error. One such source is error in the weighting benchmarks themselves: re-weighting across the NPORS partisanship benchmark’s approximate 95% sampling band increases potential survey error by about 1.01 percentage points for questions highly correlated with vote choice — which, combined in quadrature with the margin of sampling error, yields an adjusted margin of error of plus or minus 3.14 percentage points. A full sensitivity analysis appears in the topline appendix.

Fieldwork provider methodology. The following describes Verasight’s sampling and data-quality procedures for this project. The sampling criteria were: adult (age 18+), U.S. resident, and affirmatively matched to the L2 voter file database as a registered voter; the final sample includes only respondents who passed all data quality assurance checks, outlined below. The margin of sampling error calculated by Verasight using the classical random sampling formula, before accounting for the design effect of weighting, is plus or minus 2.5%.

All respondents were recruited via email from the Verasight Community, which is composed of individuals recruited via random address-based sampling, random person-to-person text messaging, and dynamic online targeting. All Verasight community members are verified via multi-step authentication, including providing an SMS response from a mobile phone registered with a major U.S. carrier as well as within-survey technology verifying the absence of non-human responses, such as Google reCAPTCHA v3.

To further ensure data quality, the Verasight data team implements a number of post-data-collection quality assurance procedures, including confirming that all responses correspond with U.S. IP addresses, confirming no duplicate respondents, verifying the absence of non-human responses, and removing any respondents who failed in-survey attention and/or straight-lining checks. Respondents who completed the survey in less than 30% of the median completion time were removed. Unmeasured error in this or any other survey may exist. Verasight is a member of the American Association for Public Opinion Research Transparency Initiative.

Message experiment

Experiment. Respondents were randomly assigned one of two messages and rated its convincingness (0–10). The mass-deportation view question was asked before (Q8) and re-asked after (Q13) the message content; both are shown by arm below.

Economic-cost message (n = 792): *Trump’s raids are deporting the workers who grow our food and staff our restaurants, and that’s driving up your grocery and health care costs — making it harder to get by.*

Billionaires message (n = 799): *Trump’s raids are deporting the workers who grow our food and staff our restaurants, and that’s driving up your grocery and health care costs — while billionaires get another tax break.*

Mean convincingness (0–10, weighted): economic-cost message 5.3, billionaires message 6.1.

Appendix: Sensitivity of the weighting to benchmark error

The weighting pins two partisan benchmarks that carry their own uncertainty: the NPORS leaned party-identification distribution (itself a survey, with sampling and house error) and 2024 past vote, pinned to the certified national results (which recalled vote may not match if respondents misremember their vote). The table below re-weights the survey on the full ten-dimension design across a range of alternative values for the two benchmarks, and reports the leaned generic congressional ballot margin under each combination. Rows vary the leaned party-margin target, Democrats including leaners minus Republicans including leaners (the benchmark is D+4). Columns vary the recalled two-party 2024 vote-margin target (the certified result is Trump +1.6). The cell at the benchmark values is the published weighting.

Benchmark error is dominated by the party dimension: across the NPORS margin's approximate 95% sampling band (plus or minus 3 points) alone, the generic ballot ranges from D+5.1 to D+8.7, while recalled-vote error of plus or minus 2 points alone moves it only from D+6.2 to D+7.6. Even at the joint extremes of both benchmarks the Democratic lead ranges from D+3.8 to D+10.0. This benchmark uncertainty is additional to the margin of sampling error reported in the methodology.

Added margin of error from benchmark uncertainty

Distilled into margin-of-error terms: treating the party benchmark as carrying a standard error of 1.5 points on the leaned Democratic–Republican margin (the approximate NPORS sampling error, with an allowance for house effects) and the recalled-vote benchmark 1 point on the two-party margin, we propagate both through the full weighting for every percentage in this topline. Across all 175 reported percentages, benchmark uncertainty adds a median of ± 0.2 points of margin of error, ± 0.7 at the 90th percentile, and at most ± 1.0 (the generic-ballot shares). Combined in quadrature with the margin of sampling error, the most benchmark-sensitive percentages carry a total margin of about ± 3.1 points. The most affected estimates:
